







#### Introduction



How do the spaces we live and eat and play in also allow for a functional and separate use for work?










## The dining room














#### Iterations
























Several iterations of the room partition were made with respect to proportions and functionality. Variations of a single model were laid out to suit different functions and, age groups and activities. This opened up possiblities for a complete collection of room screens.














## **Prototypes**

These iterations were further prototyped into 3 dimensional models to test out the structural feasibility and proportions. White foam core was used to make scaled models and achieve a look and feel of these designs in actual space.

Some of the shapes and proportions did fail in terms of structural stability and thus led to an informed design process. Observations from these prototypes were refined along this process to obtain the right proportions.

# Multifunctional patchwork

The room partitions provide different surfaces of various colors and textures that appeal to our senses and enhances the interation between the users and these dividers. We live in current times of a pandemic where touching anything is a taboo. Providing these multple surfaces at home makes these partions more personal. These surfaces can be suited to the activity. Materials like **felt, writing board, vinyl, fabric** and **wood** are used.








## Collection

Arra is a collection of room dividers that allow a subtle divide between home and work. The window screen brings the outside on the inside making room for nature. The screens are designed to create a transient pause on entering the divided space and not completely shut out of the sorrounding environment.







The collection consists of variations suited to different activities. Different surfaces like white writing board, pin up board, felt board, window planters and fabric lined board is available for personalization.








#### Details

The room divider is made up of a wooden frame that is fit together using tenon and mortise joint. The frame rests on the supports and locks into place using wooden dowels. The dark walnut plant box consists of a lid for placing things. The sheet cover inside allows for easy maintainence. The planter box is attached to the frame by a wooden dowel and metal ribs that provides further stability.



These dividers usually come in 2 pieces that can be fit together in creative ways. The shapes are open ended and thus stimulate the child's imagination.





### Details

The dividers can be arranged in a staggered formation, held into place by wooden dowels. These toy dowels can pushed into the holes provided on these pieces for a creative engagement.

Taking inspiration from the floor screens, similar shapes, colors, and proportions come together to create a Whirl coffee table. The table comes in 3 pieces that can be joined or taken apart in a fun way depending on the type of activity. It is a multi-use table that can be adjusted by rotating the other pieces along the central circle and therefore finds a place in any corner of the home.





The table is designed using interesting supports that forms an interesting graphic table top. This table is ideal for a 2+ children home with each child using a part of the table to work. The colors and shapes further enhances the interaction between the table and the child.
